(to the tune of "Three Little Monkeys Jumping on the Bed")

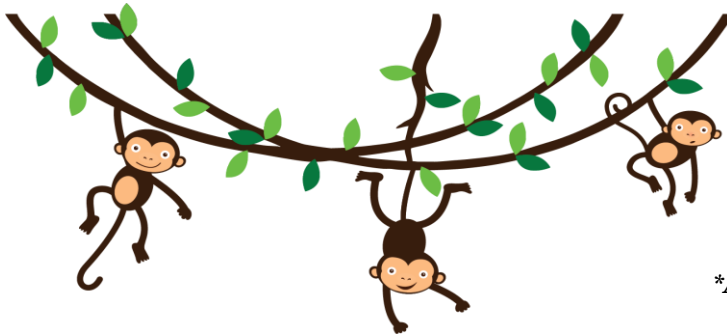
Tres ositos brincaban en la cama
