¿Cuántos hay?- *How many are there?*
el maestro(a)- *teacher of younger students*
el profesor(a)- *teacher of older students- usually late high school or college age*
el alumno(a)- *young student*
el estudiante- *older student*
Note: These words will change to “La” instead of “El” with an “-a” ending for females.
la clase de matemáticas- *math class*
la clase de música- *music class*
la clase de arte- *art class*
la clase de educación física- *phy ed or gym class*
mañana es- *tomorrow is*
hoy es- *today is*
ayer fue- *yesterday was*
el _(number)_ de _(month)_ - *the date in Spanish*
example: el ocho de marzo- *March 8*

Keep practicing at home for five minutes each night for optimal retention. Sing canciones/songs and play games from class, for example the “Mesarena” or a Days of the Week song.

domingo, lunes
martes, miércoles
jueves, viernes, sábado
domingo, lunes
martes, miércoles
jueves, viernes, sábado

(It goes against the culture- but lyrically it doesn't work to begin with lunes.)
