Sentence structure is different in Spanish!

When a noun and adjective are next to each other in an English sentence, they will trade places in the Spanish sentence. For example: "Juan is a tall boy." Boy is a noun; tall is an adjective. The Spanish sentence is "Juan es un chico alto." (Juan is a boy tall.)

Más información

For informal you, choose "tú". For formal you, choose Usted. (Most often abbreviated as Ud.) For example: Because Paco is your friend, he would be a "tú". Because Mr. Gonzales is your father's boss, he would be an "Ud."
