Notas Culturales

Mexican families often have tortillas with every meal. They sometimes use their tortillas to scoop up their food and sometimes to dip into their food. For example: During *desayuno* it is common to pick up *huevos revueltos* with a tortilla. During *almuerzo*, it is not uncommon to dip a tortilla into *sopa*. Tortillas can also be used to hold food items. For example at *cena*, it is common to cut-up meat and put it in the tortilla with *salsa* and other items such as beans and rice and eat it as a taco. Tortillas can be made of *maiz* (corn) or *harina* (flour). Some families still make their own tortillas, but many buy them at the grocery store or *mercado* pre-made.
