6. NOTA CULTURAL and LISTENING ACTIVITY: ¿A qué hora comes el almuerzo? At what time do you eat lunch?

In many parts of Latin America, lunch (called "comida" or "almuerzo") is often the largest and most important meal of the day, often taking place between 1:00 pm and 3:00 pm. This is in contrast to North American and European cultures where dinner is typically the main meal.

In Mexico and Guatemala lunch is often considered the most important meal, and families and friends come together to share a leisurely meal with rich flavors and hearty dishes.

In Spain, which has a significant influence on many Latin American cultures, lunch is also the largest meal of the day, often involving several courses and lasting several hours.

There is no one singular type of traditional "Latin-American Food," each country, and even different regions within them, have their own unique dishes! *
